The memory of Simon carrying his little Razor (white Maltese) out of the woods after she had been kidnapped and killed by an owl still brings tears to my eyes. Red (a red, long, short-legged funny looking rescue), the victim of a hit and run. I remember thinking to myself that Si had just lost the best friend he would ever have. Leverett attached Stella's (black lab) dog tag to his key chain and her ashes sit on a shelf in his office. And then Dewey, who drifted off peacefully in my arms as Lynn Prather prayed over him. There were funerals. And then there was always the question: do dogs go to heaven.

Years ago, I asked that question of Steph Britt. Many of you may remember him. He served here as the associate rector in the early 2000s. He said, "Bunny, God breathes the breath of life into all creatures, and I don't believe that God ever wastes his breath."

Think about that. God breathes the breath of life into each of us...all creatures great and small. His own life-giving breath. Our first breath, the breath of life from God himself.

And then Jesus breathed the gift of the Holy Spirit into the disciples. And at Pentecost, God gifted us with the Holy Spirit. The same Holy Spirit who moved over the face of the waters at creation. Who spoke through the prophets. Through whose power Christ became man.

God gives us the breath of life. And then he gives us the Holy Spirit, to sustain us in this life. To give us comfort and guidance. To assure us of God's love and presence. And the gift of the Holy Spirit remains within us until we exhale that very last breath, giving back to God what he so lovingly gave to us, as we surrender ourselves into the arms of Jesus. So, yes, I believe that dogs go to heaven. And they, with tails wagging, will be standing there with Jesus to greet us when we get to heaven. And they won't have to wear a collar or a leash anymore!
